My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In two weeks, we will enter into the Season of Advent, the time that we Catholic Christians set aside to prepare for the coming of our Lord at Christmas. For many of us, the days leading to Christmas are so hectic that the religious dimensions of the Season are buried under an avalanche of things to do and promises to keep. In our country, the sights and sounds of the Christmas Season are overwhelmingly secular. Santa is everywhere, but the baby Jesus cannot be found. We have to make a concerted effort to be mindful of the fact that December is a holy month, calling us to spiritual preparation in anticipation of the arrival of Emmanuel.

In order to help us stay focused on the true meaning of the Season, there are certain things that we can do:

We should all have an Advent Wreath in our homes and, throughout the Season of Advent, set aside a few minutes each day to light the candles of the wreath and offer a prayer to God. (Advent prayers will be available for all parishioners.)

One of the best ways for us to prepare for Christmas is by experiencing the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The Church teaches that every Catholic should receive this sacrament at least twice a year. On Wednesday evening, December 12th, at 7:00 p.m., we will have a communal Reconciliation Service. I strongly encourage you to join with other members of our Parish Family for an evening of prayer and healing.

The joys of Christmas await us; but in order for us to appreciate its deeper meaning, we must prepare for it properly. The Season of Advent affords us that opportunity.

They thanked God for a successful first harvest in their new home by inviting their Indian neighbors, the Wampanoags, to a three-day festival. Many Catholics celebrate Thanksgiving by attending Mass.
