

Today's Readings!

First Reading -- Isaiah speaks of the servant whom the Lord upholds; he shall bring forth justice to the nations (Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7).

Psalm -- The Lord will bless his people with peace (Psalm 29).

Second Reading -- Jesus was anointed by God with the Holy Spirit; he went out healing and doing good (Acts 10:34-38).

Gospel -- A voice comes from heaven proclaiming Jesus as the beloved Son, with whom God is well pleased (Matthew 3:13-17).

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In today's first reading we hear the prophet Isaiah speaking of a mysterious figure he calls the servant of God. In a series of such references it turns out that this servant is one who is anointed by God to bring justice and peace to his people. But he will do it by paying a terrible price: he will be rejected and eventually killed.

Christians have always believed that this person turned out to be the Lord Jesus. We have just left the Christmas season with its warmth and joy and already we must be prepared for the goal towards which the birth of Christ has destined him: his suffering and death.

In these perilous times when war and hatred seem to have the upper hand in human affairs, when the world is filled with ever escalating violence, we have to remember that Jesus, the Prince of Peace, endured suffering and death as a reward of his life and teaching about peace and love. But he lives in us who believe in him and are sustained by the grace and presence of God in our lives.

In April 1968 Senator Robert Kennedy was running for president and he was scheduled to give a speech in a poor black neighborhood of Indianapolis. Just before he arrived he got the terrible news that Martin Luther King, Jr. had been murdered. To console his hearers, horrified by the news he had to tell them, the senator reached back to an ancient Greek poet, Aeschylus, and found words that mirror exactly the biblical message of how we can survive and go on in this world of violence and destruction:

“Even in our sleep, pain falls
drop by drop upon the heart,
until, even in our own despair,
against our will,
comes wisdom
through the awful grace of God.”

Called to Serve!

For many weeks now, we have been celebrating the appearance of the divine presence in human form. As a child, he came to Mary and Joseph, was seen by the shepherds and then by some wandering magi from the East. Today, we celebrate another showing, later in time, to a group gathered at the Jordan River.

John hesitated to baptize Jesus, whom he recognized as "one mightier than I." But, he did as Jesus asked, and the "Holy Spirit descended" and heaven's voice spoke to Jesus, "You are my beloved Son." Jesus was beginning his public life of teaching and service. Soon he would start calling others to join him.

Peter was one of the first to be called by Jesus. In today's second reading, he announces the heart of the message, "peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all." Peter was called, and you and I are called to spread that message and to serve God's word.

Treasures From Our Tradition!

Through the centuries, artists and craftspeople have depicted Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River by John. At first in mosaics and frescoes, and later in tapestries, stained glass, and paintings, the scene is familiar. Jesus is standing waist-high in flowing water. Above him, standing on dry land, John the Baptist pours water over Jesus. The first artists to depict this were sketching from memory. This is exactly how most people were baptized in the early days: as adults, standing or kneeling in the water, with water poured over their heads.

This method of baptizing, called immersion, is the favored way today. An adult enters a font, or an infant is lowered a bit into the water supported by a parent's hand, and water is poured or splashed over them. The treasures of baptistery art attest that submersion, or plunging beneath the water's surface, is not really in our tradition, and that "infusion," the mere pouring of a few drops of water, yields too narrow an understanding of what it means to be plunged into Christ's life. Jesus Christ has gone before us into the water, and waits for us there with abundant gifts. No wonder the tradition calls for abundant symbols!
