

My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I want to give you an update on the latest guidelines that are now in place for indoor Liturgies:

Parishioners who have been vaccinated may attend Mass without wearing masks, but they are also free to continue wearing masks for their comfort. Unvaccinated parishioners must continue to wear masks for their safety and the safety of others.

Parishioners are no longer required to sit separately from one another. Holding hands for the Lord's Prayer and offering one another a physical expression of the Sign of Peace are optional.

Holy Water may be found in the copper vessels at the St. James Drive and Park Boulevard entrances to the Church.

Greeters and ushers are needed to help reestablish the Ministry of Welcome. If you would like to volunteer, please call the Parish Office and leave a message for me.

We will return to the previous schedule for Masses on Sunday, August 1st. Mass will be celebrated on Saturday evening at 5:00 p.m.; Sundays at: 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.; Monday through Friday Daily Mass at 8:00 a.m.

I am hoping that we can celebrate "Welcome Home" at all the Masses followed with hospitality the weekend of August 15th.

Jesus' Example of Helping Others!

In today's second reading, Paul offers a wonderful argument to his converts at Corinth for seeking to help those in need. He is dealing with a practical problem, arranging a collection for the poor of the church of Jerusalem; but as he often does, he develops an important teaching about Jesus to make his point.

After asking that they show their faith by generous gifts, he reminds them of the "gracious act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9). In the Incarnation, our Lord assumed our human nature, certainly becoming poor for one who is God. The ultimate gracious act of this poverty was going to the cross with all its terrible sufferings. By this act of poverty, we definitely become rich. Now our sins can be forgiven; we can share in the very life of God through the sacraments; we can attain eternal salvation!
