

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The term "Christian nationalism" is used a lot these days. Let's think about it.

First of all, the two terms are antithetical, opposites. If you are a Christian you cannot be a nationalist; a patriot, yes. Patriotism, love of country, is a virtue; nationalism is a wicked, evil vice. Nationalism exalts one's own country at the expense of others, does to others what one would never allow to happen to one's own. War, aggression, imperialism are the roots of nationalism.

Oh, not us, you say. Well, it's been around since the foundation of the republic. Thomas Jefferson wanted to annex Cuba; the notion of manifest destiny: that this nation should extend from sea to sea, led to the genocide of the nations and their peoples that had existed here for thousands of years before the white man invaded. None of this can be ascribed to the teachings of Christianity.

Jesus wisely taught us to give Caesar, the secular government, what it was owed: pay your taxes and vote (unless, in the latter case, the government tries to prevent it). Caesar has no place in the religious and moral affairs of the people, except where the two are identical: thou shalt not kill covers both religious and civil law.

And our church? Remember that the church burned books and Jews long before Hitler; in the Crusades, Christians were urged to go to the Middle East and kill all the Muslims they could. As St. Paul reminds us: all have sinned and all need the glory of God.

War and aggression all stem from the human lust for power over people and territory. As Americans we must examine our national conscience even as we rightfully deplore the Russian war on Ukraine. As Catholic Christians we must seek the peace of Christ which is the way of generous love. Only the nation that seeks the Lord is truly blessed.

### Feast of Faith: Invitation to the Eucharistic Prayer!

After the presider washes his hands, he turns to the people and says, "Pray that our sacrifice may be acceptable to God the almighty Father." We have brought forward bread and wine and now we are asked to see in these simple gifts upon the altar a sacrifice offered to God. Our response is rich in theological meaning, "May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands." The words point to the unique role of the priest, whose hands, at his ordination, were anointed for just this purpose: that he might "sanctify the Christian people and offer sacrifice to God" (Rite of Ordination). We ask God to accept our sacrifice not because it is worthy of God, but simply "for the praise and glory of his name." God does not need our offering, but allows us to give it so that we might grow in holiness. And God, never to be outdone in generosity, gives all that we have given back to us, "for our good and the good of all his Church." This Mass benefits not just those who have gathered but, in the mysterious economy of grace, the whole Church. In the words of Saint Paul, when one part rejoices, the whole body "share[s] its joy" (1 Corinthians 12:26).
