IN MEMORIAM

Lent is half over and we move ever closer to Good Friday and the death of Jesus. But we are constantly reminded that the Passion of Christ endures, and is not just a historical event of two thousand years ago. Even in his own time Jesus spoke of others who died at the hands of tyrants, and John the Baptist was put to death by an evil king because he spoke the truth.

At the trial of Jesus Pilate scoffed, "What is truth," but Jesus said, I am the truth, and for that he died. In our time others have died for speaking the truth and calling out the tyrants who oppressed them. Examples could be multiplied but let two suffice.


Some years ago in Brazil an American nun, Dorothy Stang, was murdered helping to save indigenous peoples and their land. And just the other day in Russia Alexei Navalny was murdered. He was what the Bible would call a just man, one who spoke the truth about a vicious tyrant and all the harm he was doing to his own people. Over long years of unjust imprisonment and persecution Navalny never wavered in his fight for truth and the good.

Jesus indeed died long ago, but he did not "pass" in the sense of disappearing from our view. He is alive in our memory of him which we celebrate in every Eucharist, where the memory of his death gives life to the world.
