Sacrifice!

Today the Church focuses on the Eucharist. Today's readings remind us how connected to ancient blood sacrifices we are when offering our unbloody sacrifice. The reading from Exodus describes a solemn ritual designed so the Israelites would never forget their covenant with God.

The reading from the Letter to the Hebrews turns us from those ancient animal sacrifices, the first efforts to worship the living God. Our sacrifice is the body and blood of the Son of God. Because of Christ, we have a new covenant.

The Gospel from Mark retells the establishment of that covenant, the familiar story of the Last Supper. Juxtaposed with the story of animal sacrifice as it is here, we are challenged to listen with new attention, to remember the great price paid for our salvation. Jesus gave his body and every drop of his blood for us.

My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This weekend, we celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, more commonly known as the Feast of Corpus Christi.

I have frequently shared with you the phrase, "Jesus came to remind us of who we are and who we are called to be." Sin, fear, doubt and confusion make us blind to our true nature. Jesus came to help us recover our sight and to give us much needed insight.

"While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, 'Take this all of you, and eat it: this is the body which will be given up for you.'

When supper was ended, he took the cup... and said: 'Take this, all of you, and drink from it: this is the cup of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you and for all so that sins may be forgiven."

When we gather as a Faith Community to celebrate the Eucharist, we are acknowledging who we are: The Body of Christ. But, we are also admitting that, without the continual guidance that only Jesus can provide, we are susceptible to amnesia.

We believe that the more we participate in Jesus' salvific act of self-sacrifice, the Mass, the closer we come to realizing who we truly are: The Body of Christ.

As Catholic Christians, we remind ourselves of this fact every day of the year. As members of this Faith Community, we are doubly blessed because the name of our Church also reminds us of who we are.

Treasures From Our Tradition!

origins of today's solemnity lie in thirteenthcentury Belgium. In those days, people seldom received Holy Communion, and never the chalice. A nun in a troubled convent, Juliana of Liège, devoted her life to stirring up love for the Eucharist, lobbying for a feast day to honor the Blessed Sacrament with Masses and processions.

uliana may have been inspired by the Ascension Day processions in nearby Bruges. Crusaders brought a treasure home to Bruges from Constantinople in 1204: a reliquary said to contain a cloth from Joseph of Arimathea with which he had helped prepare the body of Jesus for burial. The stain on the cloth was said to be the holy blood itself, and so the people of Bruges built a great basilica to house the relic. Bruges became a great center of pilgrimage because of this treasure, and the procession of the Holy Blood is still one of the greatest festivals in Belgium today. The bishop carries the relic through the narrow streets, and the people wear medieval costumes and act out scenes from the Bible.
