Dear Brothers and Sisters.

One of the earliest and most basic texts of the prophet Isaiah is this:

They shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks.

One nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again.

How painfully ironic are those words in our time, as in many times past. The fact is that men love war, and the inhumanity of human beings has never changed since Cain slew Abel. Advent is a time of joy as we wait for the coming of Christ in the flesh, our own human flesh. But how that flesh is tortured and killed. How can we rejoice when our own brothers and sisters suffer in the cold of Ukraine and the rubble of Gaza.

But the words of Isaiah continue:

O house of Jacob, come,

Let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Our task as people of faith is to hold both things in our hands. We mourn the death and destruction of war, and we rejoice that the light of God shines in our hearts: not forgetting the one, nor being complacent in the other. We lift up our souls to the Lord, as the Psalm last Sunday proclaimed. And so we go on -- the journey never ends, but we do not walk alone.

#### **Treasures From Our Tradition!**

Look around most Catholic churches, and you will discover an image of John the Baptist, often in the old baptistery, or in a window near where the font is or was located. He has two feast days in the calendar: one commemorating his birth and the other his death. There are only three nativities in our calendar: for Jesus, for Mary and for the Baptist. John's birthday is reckoned according to the schedule given in Luke's Gospel of the angel's announcement to Mary. The angel tells her that her cousin Elizabeth is in the sixth month of pregnancy, and so Mary hastens to help her. Reckoning Christmas as December 25, we count backwards nine months to March 25 for the Feast of the Annunciation. Then we count forward three months to June 24 for John the Baptist's birth. Halfway to Christmas, his nativity gives ample reason for rejoicing in the summer, and his symbols of fire and water are used playfully in bonfires and dives into the sea. Even at the polar opposite of Christmas in the calendar, the energy of Christ's birth in the Incarnation provides cause for rejoicing.

## Sacrament of Reconciliation!

One of the best ways for us to prepare for Christmas is by experiencing the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The Church teaches that every Catholic should receive this sacrament at least twice a year. On Wednesday evening, December 18<sup>th</sup>, at 7:00 p.m., we will have a communal Reconciliation Service. I strongly encourage you to join with other members of our Parish Family for an evening of prayer and healing.
