My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

During this liturgical year, most of the weekly gospel readings will be taken from the Gospel of Luke. While Luke shares a

number of common themes with Matthew and, to a lesser extent with Mark, his gospel offers us a unique theological and historical perspective.

Little is known about the author of the third gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. Tradition holds that he was a Greek-speaking Syrian from Antioch who was a physician by profession. We also know that he was a disciple and close friend of Paul. Luke enthusiastically supported Paul in his mission to bring the message of Christianity to the Gentile world. Because Luke was a Gentile writing primarily to and for Gentiles, his two-volume work was very important to the non-Jewish followers of Christianity.

There were a number of significant issues that Luke had to address for his audience; I'll mention two of them:

First, because Luke did not know the historical Jesus, he had to show that his recounting of the life and ministry of the Savior was based on accurate eye witness accounts. He states this explicitly in the Prologue of his gospel.

More importantly, Luke wanted his audience to know that it was irrelevant that they had not experienced the historical Jesus and that they were Gentiles. One of the central themes of his gospel is that Jesus' salvific act of redemption transcends time and culture.

This was Good News for his listeners and Good News for you and me.

 $W^{O}$  may think that the point of today's familiar story e of the wedding at Cana is that when we have faith in Jesus, our lives will be pleasantly changed. A Christian, however, needs to have a broader perspective and realize that, to have faith in Christ, means that somebody's life -- maybe our own, maybe somebody else's -- will be surprised for the better.

## **Treasures From Our Tradition!**

The cause of church unity is commended to Christians for prayer and action every year around this time. This week is not so much to focus on the many divisions within the Christian family, but on bonds of faith and mission. Even though Christians have always shown an inclination to fracture, spin off, and mutate into new expressions, recent history shows some new points of convergence and agreement. Catholics are more firmly rooted in the word of God, for example, and many Protestants are more likely to celebrate Communion than in years past. Some denominations are merging and pooling resources, and people from various traditions are collaborating on projects.

The call of this week is to be mindful of the diversity of our traditions and customs while treasuring what we hold in common. The old advice to "lighten up" is good medicine, because sometimes our differences are delightful and amusing. If someone says, "Let us pray," a Catholic might close the eyes, bow the head and fold hands; a Protestant reach out and clasp hands with the person in the next chair; and someone belonging to an Orthodox tradition might stand up with eyes wide open. Each has taken a different path but the goal is always the same. This is a week not for focusing on the well-worn paths of divergence, but for mutual delight in a common goal.
