Priests Retirement Collection!

ocese of Oakland. With one hundred active priests over the age of 60 or older, the number of retired clergy will grow considerably over the next decade. In addition, thanks be to God, our retired clergy are living longer and continue to help at Masses. However, this increases the cost above projections that were made when the system was put in place a couple of decades ago. Also, priests who come to our Diocese from another one or religious orders to serve the people of Oakland do not bring their retirement benefits with them. They start with zero when they begin to minister here. After meeting with the Priests' Retirement Board in 2013, it was recommended to add this second collection which will be next weekend, September 13th and 14th. Thank you for your support!

My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Last Wednesday, September 3rd, we joined Catholic communities around the world to celebrate St. Phoebe's Feast Day. After Vatican II, Pope Gregory the Great's Feast Day was moved to September 3rd and Phoebe's commemoration was sidelined. It's time to give this remarkable saint her due!

St. Paul introduces us to Phoebe in Romans 16:1-2:

"I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a deacon of the church at Cenchreae, so that you may receive her in the Lord in a way worthy of the saints and help her in whatever she may need from you; for she has been a benefactor of many and of myself as well."

This short passage carries great weight. Paul names Phoebe *diakonos* (deacon) -- the only person named deacon in the entire Bible. She was so distinguished that Paul told the Romans to treat her as a saint, an extraordinary honor for a woman (and man). Female deacons weren't unusual in the early church, serving from the 5th through 12th centuries. They received the same ordination rite as male deacons.

Phoebe wasn't just given a title. Paul chose her as his apostolic emissary for a perilous mission: to carry his Letter to the Romans from Greece to Rome and be the first to interpret his complex theology. It was a grueling 700-mile journey and no small feat, as women were not allowed to travel alone. Yet, Phoebe's powerful passage is excluded from our Sunday Lectionary readings, leaving most Catholics unaware of her trailblazing and prominent role in the early Church.

By the end of 2025, a Vatican study group focused on women's roles -- including female deacons -- will deliver their recommendations to Pope Leo. Let's pray for greater recognition and participation for women at every level of our Church, including restoring the female diaconate that Phoebe boldly represents.

Attitude Change!

Today's readings ask us to re-think our attitudes and ways. The passage from the book of Wisdom reminds us that, when it comes to understanding, even the wisest person barely scrapes the surface of

things.

In Paul's provocative little letter to Philemon, the apostle praises Philemon for his understanding of the social order -- which included slavery -- and for his good treatment of Onesimus. Then Paul goes on to drop his bombshell. He tells Philemon that Onesimus is now a Christian and should be treated as such -- as a brother, an equal. What was Philemon to think?

Today's Gospel tells us that if we are to follow Jesus, we must do some serious planning. Then, once all our planning is complete, we have to be willing to accept the fact that our plans are never enough.

Treasures From Our Tradition!

In recent years, there has been remarkable progress in drawing persons with disabilities into full celebration. Now it is generally accepted that worship places need accommodations such as ramps or elevators, large-print materials for those who are sight-impaired, and perhaps even an assisted hearing system or signing in American Sign Language. American Sign Language is not merely English translated into movement, but a distinct language with its own grammar, syntax (word order) and vocabulary. For this reason, the American Catholic bishops have approved American Sign Language (ASL) as an official language of the liturgy. Celebrating liturgy in our own language (the vernacular) means that liturgy must be accessible for all languages and cultures. The fact that Mass is celebrated this weekend in some places in total silence, but with the full participation of deaf people praising God in the movements of their hands, and sometimes even with a priest who is deaf, is nothing less than the Church being faithful to the image of Jesus, who made the deaf hear and the mute speak.
