Priests Retirement Collection!

Currently, we have over forty retired priests in the Diocese of Oakland. With one hundred active priests over the age of 60 or older, the number of retired clergy will grow considerably over the next decade. In addition, thanks be to God, our retired clergy are living longer and continue to help at Masses. However, this increases the cost above projections that were made when the system was put in place a couple of decades ago. Also, priests who come to our Diocese from another one or religious orders to serve the people of Oakland do not bring their retirement benefits with them. They start with zero when they begin to minister here. After meeting with the Priests' Retirement Board in 2013, it was recommended to add this second collection which will be this weekend, September 13th and 14th. Thank you for your support!



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On Good Friday, at the ceremony of the adoration of the cross, the minister sings, "Behold the wood of the cross, on which hung the Saviour of the world." It is a very moving event, in which the whole congregation participates.

We venerate the wood, because of him who hung on it, just as, in the Eucharist before the reading of the gospel, we venerate the book, because of the words, the message which the book contains.

In our faith symbols like the wood of the cross and the gospel book are important because they lead us beyond simply what we see to a hidden reality which is the point of using the symbol.

In our secular world we frequently hear, "oh, it's just a symbol." That betrays a basic ignorance of a powerful means of looking beyond the obvious. The cross of Christ in itself was a horrible means of torture and death; as the symbol of Christ's redeeming love it becomes for us a deeper understanding of what our faith is all about.

The sign of the cross identifies us as followers of the Lord of life and love. Always make it with loving reverence.

Psalm -- Do not forget the works of the Lord (Psalm 78).


Second **R**eading -- Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped (Philippians 2:6-11).

Being Lifted Up!

In today's Gospel, Jesus reminds Nicodemus how Moses had "lifted up the serpent in the desert." Then Jesus says, "So must the Son of Man be lifted up, that all who believe may have eternal life in him." The evangelist clearly saw this "lifting up" of Jesus to mean his crucifixion. That "lifting up" of the serpent by Moses is described in today's first reading. The people were attacked by "saraph serpents," and many died. God had Moses make an image of the serpent and put it on a pole and lift it up. The people who had been bitten looked at it and recovered. Jesus "emptied himself, taking the form of a slave." Lifted up on the cross, he was despised and seemed the most abject of people. But, it was in embracing this disgrace and painful death that he became the bearer of eternal life for all of us. His "lifting up" in shame was also his "lifting up" in glory and triumph.
