Getting Ready!

Today marks the beginning of another liturgical year. The tone of today's readings casts us in the role of students learning solemn lessons. The reading from Isaiah sets the stage, calling us up a mountain to receive the Lord's instruction. In this passage, we study peace. Then, Paul steps forth with sober admonitions. We have to wake up; the day is almost here. Live honorably in the light. Paul reminds us that we really do know the time in which we are living.

Finally, Matthew presents Jesus the storyteller. Just imagine, Jesus tells us what it was like in Noah's time. He paints a vivid picture of ordinary people living ordinary lives and ignoring the warnings that Noah heeded. Totally unconcerned, they were destroyed. How will it be any different for us? No one knows when the Lord will come. But, we have been warned.

Perhaps we find such sobering scriptures unappealing and threatening. But, within them there is promise. We are to live in the light with nothing to hide. We are to be ready.

My Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As we begin the Season of Advent, I want to share with you some thoughts that I read about this period of anticipation and preparation offered by the noted Jesuit, Walter J. Burghardt:

"Advent can be confusing. What are we about in the liturgy -- in this liturgy that is supposed to symbolize what goes on in the rest of our lives? The Lord has come and yet we prepare for his coming. He is risen, and still we ready a crib for him. We rejoice that he lives within us and we cloth ourselves in purple. Has 'the day of the Lord' dawned or hasn't it? Is Advent makebelieve? Are we pretending that the Lord has not yet come?"

"The fact is, Advent expresses in symbol and ritual three stages in the human journey, in the Christian journey. Christ has come; Christ will come again; and Christ is here now. We remember the first; we look to the second; we live the third. All three are part and parcel of our lives; so all three have to find expression in our liturgy."

Treasures From Our Tradition!

"People in love make signs of love," wrote our bishops in a document guiding the renewal of liturgical music. They were not merely urging us to sing at Mass, but suggesting that the song itself is a sign of the love of Christ. Love never expressed dies, as we know from experience. Flowers for no special reason, a caress, a hug, a turn around the dance floor, a note on the pillow or in the lunchbox, the aroma of fresh bread in the kitchen, all are signs of love's vitality. A significant treasure in our Catholic tradition is the place of the sacraments as signs of Christ's love. We can trace the sacraments back to scriptural sources, through centuries of history. They are woven through family tradition and our own life story. Sacraments are the way Christ makes signs of love for the Church. For twenty centuries, God has spoken to us in the arena of the sacraments and we have responded. For the next year of "Treasure" essays, we will explore the story of sacraments: their sources, their signs and rituals, and the way Christ nurtures and sustains us as we encounter him, the companion on our journey who loves us and faithfully makes signs of that love.
